We are engaging with stakeholders and lawmakers on necessary steps to safely resume therapeutic rehabilitation and education services, and to expand capacity to serve a larger number of medium/maximum security young men. - DCYF continues to pursue leasing of new physical space. Options are under review.
- DCYF and DOC established a Unified Command at GHS, focusing on goals and conditions that contribute to safety.
- Some residents returned to cafeteria use for meals for the first time in four years.
